### Pre-Public Examinations Three (Year 11) and Pre-Public Examinations 1 (Sixth Form)

Below is the timetable for Year 11 PPE3 and Sixth Form PPE1 examinations; copies of which will be found in the exams sections on the school website and will also be displayed around school. Individual Candidate Timetables will be sent to students and parents through In Touch, so students will need to check their emails.

Students will be attending lessons as normal when not sitting an exam.

### EXPECTATIONS FOR STUDENTS

- Make sure you check the seating plans posted in the playground in case there is a change of room for your exam (line up in the playground at least 15 minutes before the start time)
- Bring all the equipment you will need for the exam [black pens, pencils, ruler, calculator (where allowed), protractor, compasses]
- Full school uniform/smart business wear needs to be worn, with IDs placed on the exam desk
- Make sure you understand the rules
- Mobile phones/ watches, or any other product with potential technological/web enabled sources of information must be switched off and put in bags. **Any student found with such a device on them in an exam room will face disqualification from that exam**
- Any pencil cases taken into the exam room must be see-through
- Only small water bottles will be allowed into the exam room and must have all labels removed

#### You must not take into the exam room:

- notes
- a calculator case/instruction leaflet

Well done to **Malachi, Lauren, Mohammed** and **Jude** for being stand out players every game.

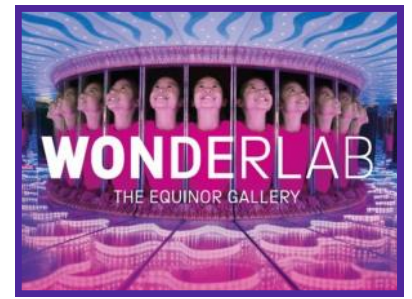

## Science Museum Visit



On 23 November around 40 students from Year 8 Cambridge and Year 7 Bury were lucky enough to be invited to the Science Museum in London. We were welcomed by the friendly Explainers at the Wonderlab in the Equinor Gallery who took us through the beauty of Science and Maths that shapes our everyday lives. Spread across seven different zones, there were live Science shows and demonstrations and lots of opportunity to interact with real scientific phenomena. We saw lightning strike before our eyes, played with forces on giant slides, travelled through space under a canopy of stars and made our own clouds.

During the afternoon, we were entertained by Dr Ken Farquhar who delivered an amusing presentation entitled 'How to Save the Planet in 45 minutes'. 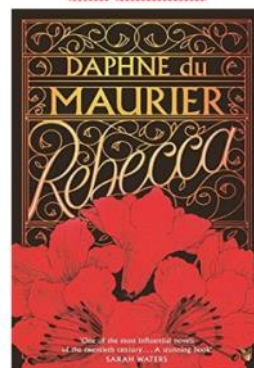

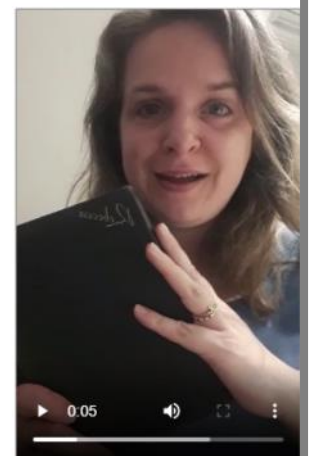

Maybe Christmas, perhaps, means a little bit more!



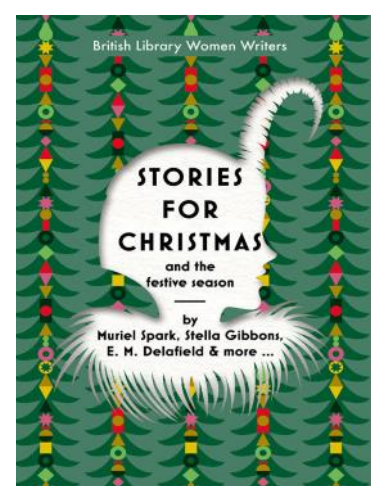
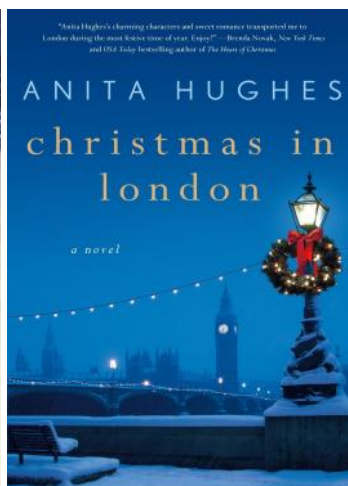
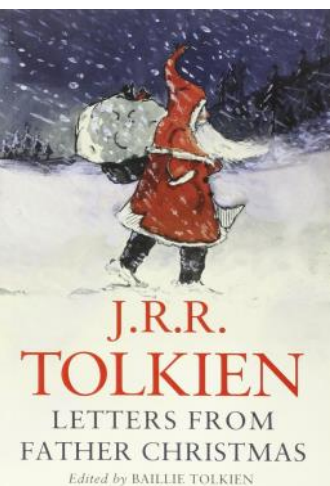
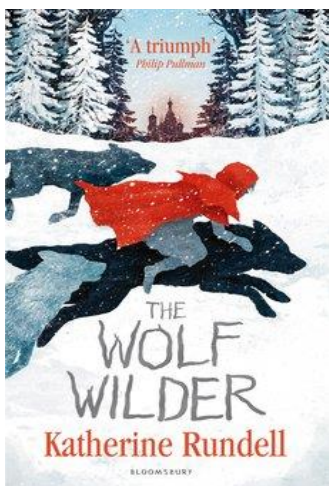
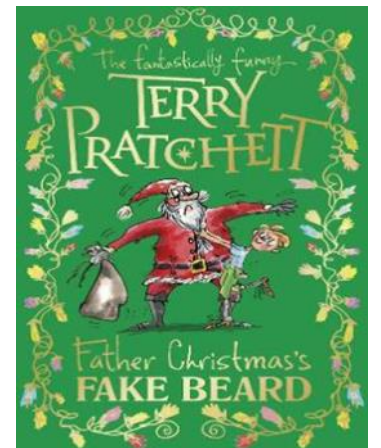
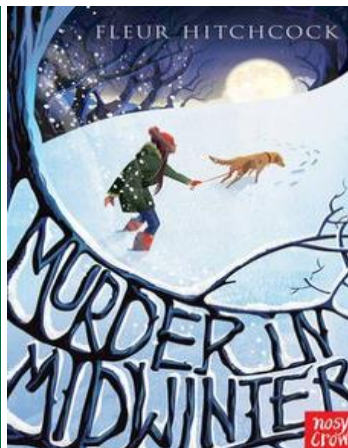
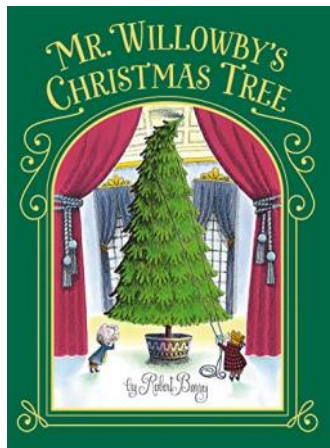
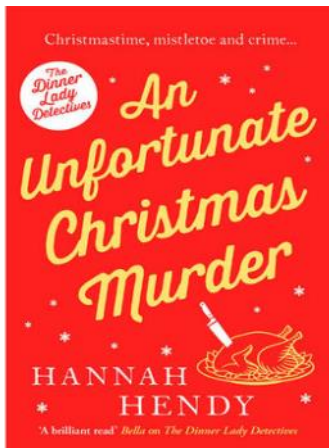
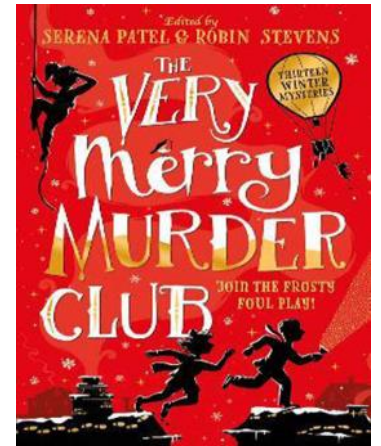
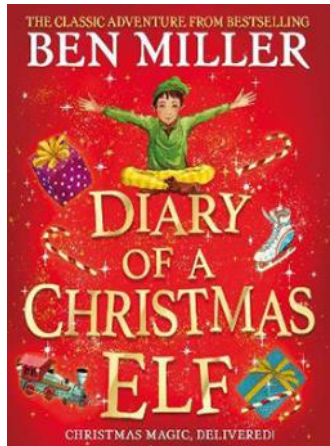
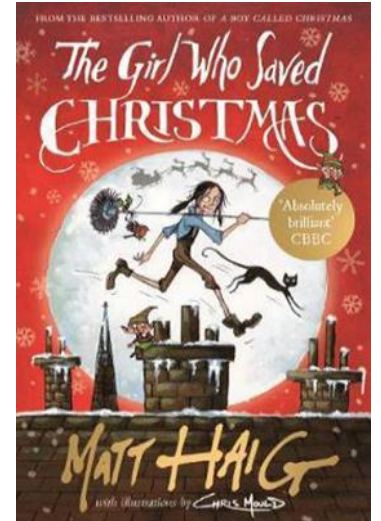
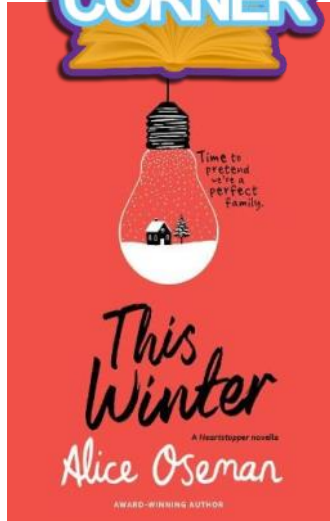

### **Food Pantries**

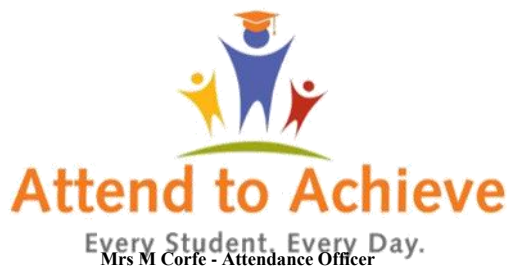
